4.2	Overview of Community Drug Strategy committee structure survey results	Sherry presented survey findings. To inform next steps and help shape the new CDS structure, Public Health Sudbury & Districts sought input from a vast network of community stakeholders including Summit participants and invitees, CDS members, as well as perspectives from people with lived experience and Indigenous Peoples. Feedback was collected using Survey Monkey and participation in the survey was voluntary. Survey findings were used to inform recommendations regarding the CDS structure and membership, which were reviewed at this meeting.	S. Price
4.3	Direction for the reinvigoration of the Community Drug Strategy	In consideration of survey findings, recommendations were brought forward to the CDS Executive Committee for consideration and approval. These recommendations were made to ensure alignment of CDS operations with the current needs of the community while simultaneously providing oversight for the advancement of Summit priorities.  Initial direction from the executive committee was specific to:  • The new CDS structure • Membership  With regard to streams, specific direction included:  • Aligning operations with the three streams of the Summit (health promotion, wrap around supports and substance use care)  • The streams are accountable to Steering Committee • Streams are responsible for:  • Workplan development and implementation  • Ensuring movement of Summit priorities and other CDS initiatives  • The need for additional sub-committees or working groups may be identified and activated based on the identification of need by the committee.  • Stream co-chairs will maintain membership with the steering committee. Jeffery Hardy is the only representation from a youth perspective right now. His organization serves indigenous youth and has a pool of funds to do so.
